December Snow - Frank Ticheli

Frank Ticheli writes: December Snow was inspired by memories of one of nature's simple wonders. While it has been decades since I lived in a northern climate, I still remember the pure joy of those magical early-winter now flurries, a joy I endeavored to capture in this piece. Specific events are suggested by the music, and indicated verbally in the score: "first snowlfakes... snow picking up... out for a sleigh ride...returning hot for hot chocolate."

Ghosts of the Lost Ship - Tyler S. Grant

Tyler S. Grant writes: Ghosts of the Lost Ship was written to tell the story of buccaneer naval warfare. These credo-driven pirates are known throughout history for their attack on Spanish ships and coastal towns in the Caribbean Seas during the 17th century. This work opens with an unusual aleatoric section that creates the sounds of a buccaneer ship as it sails to combat in a dangerous rainstorm. The ship then slowly coasts into enemy territory in an attempt to be unseen. Once spotted, the buccaneers are forced to adjust the sail and race toward the enemy to engage in intense warfare. After a short and successful battle, they music quickly make their way to land and invade the Spanish towns engaging in sword combat. As the chaos cuts loose, the mighty buccaneers regroup and take flight from the Spanish territory. The ending leaves us questioning whether or not the buccaneers escaped unharmed. One thing is for sure, the ghosts linger to this day, haunting the many seas and all who pass through them.

Holly and the Ivy - Arranged by Vince Gassi

The Holly and the Ivy is a traditional British folk Christmas carol. The song can be traced back to the early nineteenth century, with the lyrics dating back to medieval times. It was made popular by English folk song collector Cecil Sharp when he heard Mary Clayton sing it in 1909 in Gloucestershire, England.

Nightsong - Richard L. Saucedo

Nightsong is a great piece to introduce our Symphonic Band members to both compound meters (6/8 time signature), as well as a minor key center. This slow piece has been a great vehicle for us to work tone, balance, and blend early in the year.

The Dark Waters - Matt Conaway

Matt Conaway writes: *The Dark Waters* revolves around the rivers of the underworld in Greek mythology, the rivers separating the land of the living from the afterlife. The most famous of these is the River Styx, typically represented alongside the ferryman Charon, who would accept payment in return for carrying the souls of the recently deceased across the dark waters.

The River Styx is seen through the eyes of the living outside observer, much like Dante in the Divine Comedy. The shock of the first vision of the underworld quickly transitions to dispassionate observation of the bleak surroundings. Eventually, the observer comes across the ferryman, who demands payment to go further. Upon paying this toll, the dark river cruise begins. The speed of the river is such that only fleeting glimpses of the afterlife can be seen, but those few are terrifying to the observer. Brief music interjections of the Dies Irae (Day of Wrath) theme can be heard as the ferry continues its journey down the river. Upon reaching the far foggy banks, the observer comes across a small group of repentant souls who offer up a prayer of salvation, but it is too late; the fog lifts, and the observer faces Hades in shocking clarity. The gates open, the souls enter their eternal rest, and the observer continues to witness the entire scene until the gates abruptly close.

Shine - Michael Markwoski

Michael Markowski writes: *Shine* is an exploration of brighter instrumental colors within a world of softer, more muted textures. For me, the imagery of light becomes all the more striking when rationed against these darkly romantic landscapes.

Dum Spiro Spero - Chris Pilsner

Chris Pilsner writes: *Dum Spiro Spero* takes its title from a Latin phrase meaning "While I breathe, I hope." When I read that phrase for the first time, I was taken back by the incredible amount of power it held and immediately knew it would be the basis for a new piece. When I started writing, my goal was to write something as deeply emotional and human as the title was. The result was a series of simple melodies supported by some of the most colorful orchestration and harmonies I've ever written. From the lush opening, the gentle singing, and ultimately the triumphal climax, the human quality to the music is what I think give *Dum Spiro Spero* a powerful sense of grace and splendor.

Sleigh Ride - Leroy Anderson

Leroy Anderson states: Sleigh Ride was one of the first things I wrote when I got out of the Army and moved up here to Woodbury, Connecticut. Actually, I first came here in 1946; you may remember there was a housing shortage then, and my mother-in-law was living up here, had a cottage that was vacant, so since we had no other place to go, we packed our 14-month old daughter, plus the upright piano and came on up here to Woodbury, and during that first summer that we were here, I started Fiddle-Faddle, I didn't finish that until the following winter, and Sleigh Ride, and Serenata. And Sleigh Ride, I remember was just an idea because, it was just a pictorial thing, it wasn't necessarily Christmas music, and it was written during the heat wave.
